This week your child is reading *James Forten*, a biographical selection about a young African American sailor's role during the Revolutionary War and how he became a successful businessman and an influential abolitionist.



Vocabulary on the Go With your child, imagine that it is the late 1700s. Role-play the parts of a young person who wants to become a sailor and a ship's captain. Try to use the following words as you engage in a job interview together.

A Step in the Right Direction After the war, James Forten became an apprentice to Robert Bridges and learned to make sails. With your child, think of occupations that require special schooling or training, such as carpentry, surgery, or computer programming. Together, identify some of the steps a student would need to follow to learn this job. Use words such as *first*, *next*, *after that*, and *finally* in your discussion.



What Do You Want to Be? Ask your child to name a job that he or she would like to do some day. What kinds of things would your child have to learn to do?



Help your child write a want ad for the job that you discussed. Make sure the qualifications for the job are listed.



What's in a Song? Read this description about the song "Yankee Doodle" with your child. Then sing the song together.

Once taught to children as a lively nursery rhyme, British soldiers brought "Yankee Doodle" to the colonies, using its rhythm to keep step as they marched. Later, when relationships between the British and American colonists became strained, the British soldiers made up new, insulting verses for the tune. Instead of taking offense, though, the colonists changed "Yankee Doodle" into a song reflecting pride in the Patriot cause.

Vocabulary

Effects of War

The Revolutionary War affected ordinary people because the battles took place near their homes. Tell your child that when parents, spouses, or sons and daughters are soldiers, their families are immediately affected by their absence while away on assignments. Discuss the ways a war may affect your life.

An Award Winner

Soldiers often receive awards for their bravery. Talk with your child about someone in your family who deserves an award for something he or she has done. Then have your child write a statement about why this person deserves the award and list at least three reasons that support the statement.


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


