Vocabulary on the Go One of the characters in the story is a young inventor. What are some recent inventions that you enjoy using? With your child, identify new products and inventions that make your life easier. Try to use the following words in your discussion.

Tell Me About It Ask your child to think of a favorite science fiction movie or TV show. Where does it take place? Who are the characters in it? What problems do the characters have? How do the characters solve their problem?



Dream Up an Invention Are you always late getting out of the house? Do you wish you had a robot to sort and organize household clutter? With your child, brainstorm an idea for a fanciful invention that could solve a specific everyday problem.



Help your child create a diagram of the invention. Then create an acronym for it. An acronym is a word formed from the initial letters of a name. For example, *LAFFF* stands for *Lu's Artifact for Fast Forward*.



A Taste of Asia The characters in *LAFFF* share tasty Asian dishes, such as spring rolls and humbow, a kind of barbecued pork roll. Read the following recipe with your child. Then use the ingredients to make a traditional Asian dipping sauce.

Asian Peanut Sauce

Ingredients

1/2 cup peanut butter, chunky or smooth

- 2 tablespoons teriyaki sauce
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil
- 2 garlic cloves, pressed or minced
- 1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger dash of hot sauce (optional) salt and pepper to taste



1. Put all the ingredients together in a bowl.

- 2. Stir them together until well mixed.
- 3. Serve as a dipping sauce for fresh vegetables, such as baby carrots, sliced cucumber, green or red peppers, and celery sticks.


