No-Bake Dried Fruit Granola Bars

Ingredients

1

1/2 cup chopped dried fruit

(raisins, figs, cranberries, apples)

3 cups granola

3/4 cup honey 1/4 cup corn oil

1/2 cup packed brown sugar



- 1. Put granola and dried fruit in a large bowl. Mix together.
- 2. Put honey, brown sugar, and oil in a small pot. Mix together.
- **3.** Pour the mixture into the bowl with the granola and fruit. Stir until granola and fruit are coated well.
- 4. Press mixture into an 8- or 9-inch square pan. Refrigerate.
- 5. Cut into squares. Enjoy!
