A Big Move In the story, a young girl and her family are on the move to a new life in California. What are some reasons that families decide to move to an entirely new place? What are some effects of a big move? With your child, plot out some reasons families might move. Then think of and record what might happen as a result.



Together, choose a place in a different part of the country where you might want to move. Help your child write a list of pros and cons about moving to the new place.



Two Different Takes In a journal, a writer records his or her thoughts and perspectives on events and occurrences. But do two people recall an event in the same way? With your child, write separate journal entries that tell about an everyday event you share together, such as a meal or an outing. Then compare your entries. Are you surprised?



A Valuable Guide Read and discuss this selection together.

The Prairie Traveler

Students of history are often amazed that travelers on the Oregon Trail ever reached their destinations. Believe it or not, many pioneers prepared for trips much like tourists today; they relied on traveler's guides and referred to them along the way.

One of the most useful and popular guides was *The Prairie Traveler: A Handbook for Overland Expeditions*, written by Randolph Barnes Marcy, a captain in the U.S. Army. Published in 1859, the *The Prairie Traveler* was packed with information that could save pioneers time, energy, and even their lives. How to fix a broken wagon wheel? Ways to ford a river? What



broken wagon wheel? Ways to ford a river? What to do in a storm? *The Prairie Traveler* covered all these topics, and more.

Marcy's long career working for the military on the frontier provided him with practical knowledge about every aspect of preparation and survival. No doubt, countless pioneers were grateful that Marcy shared his knowledge; more than a few lives were likely saved by a handy copy of *The Prairie Traveler*.


