Look It Over This week your child is also reading a selection about animals that includes a lot of visual information, including photographs and captions. With your child, look for magazine articles about animals. Then work together to list the different visual features, such as photos, captions, maps, and diagrams. Summarize what each feature tells you about the subject.



Storytellers The myth your child read is in the form of a play. Most myths like this one were originally in story form. These stories were handed down from generation to generation by storytellers. What are some stories that you and your child know that have been handed down? What do the stories tell about?



Together, choose a story you both know. Take turns telling the story. How were the retellings the same? How were they different?



More on Migration Read and discuss this selection with your child. It tells about a bird that spends much of its life moving.

Frequent Fliers

Many birds are migratory, traveling from place to place to breed and overwinter. The Arctic tern, however, beats out all the competition. Rarely seen by humans except during nesting seasons, Arctic terns travel more than 22,000 miles each year!

These medium-sized birds enjoy two summers each year, as they travel from the Arctic regions of North America, Europe, and Asia to the seacoasts of the Antarctic. They live for about 30 years; in a lifetime, therefore, the average Arctic tern may travel more than 500,000 miles—a distance comparable to flying to the moon and back!



Arctic terns primarily eat fish and other
marine creatures they catch on the wing—or even steal
from other birds. Their aggressive behavior extends to their
parenting style, too. These tough birds fiercely defend their
nests by mobbing and attacking any and all intruders. If you
ever are lucky enough to see a colony of Arctic terns, keep your
distance, or you may soon find yourself in flight (or fight)!

Vocabulary
