Directions for Printing and Using Daily Weather Journals

There are 2 different daily weather journals you can use.

*The first option consists of 2 covers and 2 recording sheets to a page. You use less paper and they take up less space with this option. You will determine how many days you want to have students record daily weather conditions and make an appropriate number of copies, then staple the pages together to make a journal. You can also copy the sheets on back-to-back pages to use even less paper.

*The second option consists of 1 cover and 1 recording sheet to a page. These weather journals will be larger and you will need to use more paper, but students will have more space to write and can draw their pictures with more detail. Again, you can copy the sheets on back-to-back pages to use less paper.

*For both weather journals, students start by writing the date. I have included space for students to include the day of the week and the month and day. (example: Monday, January 2.)

*Then students will choose and write 3 weather words to describe the day's weather. (example: Today's weather is cold, sunny, and windy.)

*Next, students will draw what the weather looks like for that day and draw what the appropriate clothing is for this type of weather.
